Malaysia Excursion



This year, over twenty-five young people expressed interest in being involved in the 2019 excursion. That number dwindled quite quickly, when they realised the time and financial commitment required and the number started getting down towards a more realistic 18, still far too many, but better to work with.

As always, to be eligible, the excursion has a strong focus on appropriate behavior, attendance and engagement at school as well as making sure they are all involved in the planning and fundraising activities. That number settled at twelve for quite a while, then in the last few weeks two more students withdrew for personal reasons and the final, and ideal number of ten was reached.

After a massive 25 for 25 themed anniversary year in 2018, which raised over \$20,000 and sponsored 25 orphan students, it was going to be a tough year to beat. Although very quickly, support started to come in as well as the several annually planned events such as trivia night, sausage sizzles, chocolate sales and art exhibition.



Each year we review, analyse and reflect on previous years and look to what worked and what didn't, and discuss if anything can be done differently. With a few staff and students returning, the team always looks at new aspects of the annual excursion and one place that had not been on the itinerary for a few years was Petronas Twin Towers. Additionally students had discussed wanting more time at Klang School and in the Cameron Highlands, Gopeng Rainforest. So, with those factors in mind, Melacca was taken off the list, as was Penang and instead an extra day was added to Klang School to undertake a service project on their entrance gates and to spend more time with the students. We also planned to have an extra night in Gopeng and spread the time undertaking a few more challenging activities including time in a wet cave system.

As always, at school the weekly Malaysia classes focused on:

- Planning the trip itinerary
- Liaising with Klang Apex Club and Klang Special School
- Fundraising sausage sizzles, sponsorship letters, selling workshop made chopping boards and slumped glass bottles, an amazing art exhibition and a wonderful quiz night
- Malaysian guest speakers on customs, culture and etiquette
- Logistics including birth certificates, passports and all appropriate ID
- Booking hotels & flights
- Malaysian food experiences creating some tasty Nasi Lemak, Beef Redang and much more
- Buying Australian themed gifts for Klang Special School & Orang Asli Tribal Village children

The program really has become a finely tuned, Jam-packed trip of a lifetime for the Port students. The visit ensures cultural, educational and fun experiences throughout the time they are away whilst primarily engaging as much as possible with Klang Special School students. They also get to meet and spend time with Klang Apex Club members and additionally this year support and assist with food, clothes and toy donations at an Orang Asli indigenous settlement in Slim River.

Leaving Perth

Over 22 boxes of donations, 12 student and staff suitcases, and cabin luggage all headed to the airport to be checked in and finally bound for Malaysia. The bus was loaded up, and an excited and nervous chatter could be heard. This could only mean our ten students & two staff were about to head off to Malaysia to start the 2019 excursion. Sporting their very bright new shirts, they certainly looked the part and were all looking forward to the 5½-hour journey with Malindo airlines.







The hot and humid weather hit us all as soon as we got out of the airport. Sri, our new driver, arrived in a fabulous bus, with plenty of room for all the boxes and sultcases.







Day 1 - Malaysia Breakfast, Check In to Lax Boutique Hotel & Pulau Ketam

After a tiring overnight flight it was time for some breakfast with our host Apexians at Pickles, then checking in to the new choice of hotel, 'Lax Boutique' on the edge of Little India, stock up on water for the rooms and some snacks before heading off to Pulau Ketam for the first tour of the excursion.





Lax Boutique is a new hotel and a great find on the edge of Little India. Well positioned for the students to explore the sounds, sights and smells as well as enjoying the vibrancy of Indian shopping. The hotel itself offered a great base, being a 5-minute drive from Klang School and well positioned to get on the freeway for excursions further afield.







A 45-minute boat ride landed us on Pulau Ketam, literally translated, means "Crab Island". It is a small island located off the coast of Klang. The island was easily accessible from the Port Klang jetty by ferry. The "floating houses" that come to view as we approached the island is a sight to awe us Perth city slickers.



Perching casually on long wooden stilts, these dwellings are suspended about one to ten metres above sea level.



Pulau Ketam offered a unique opportunity for the team to witness and experience the lifestyle of fishermen and to try out the amazing seafood.













After an exhausting time of travel from Perth, and the fun of Pulau Ketam it was back to the hotel to freshen up then out into Little India to take in the busy vibrant and colourful streets whilst trying out some of the local foods and of course a bit of shopping!






Banana leaf rice is a traditional method of serving rice dishes in Malaysia, India and Singapore. In banana leaf meals, white rice is served on a banana leaf with an assortment of vegetables, pickles, appalam and other regional condiments (usually sour, salty or spicy). The banana leaf acts as a disposable plate and it in itself is not consumed. Banana leaf meals are eaten by hand and meal etiquette also dictates that, after the meal, the guest if happy with the meal, must always fold the banana leaf inwards as a sign of gratitude to the host.













Day 2 & 3 - Klang Special School & I- city

Klang Special School is an integral part of this annual excursion. Every year Port students, staff and all of our supporters make a huge difference to the lives of many of the orphan children there. They enhance Klang School by providing new equipment and facilities, by donations of toys, games and educational items. This year the team with the support of family, friends, businesses, Port staff and other students were able to donate approx. \$15,000 (40,000 Ringglt) that equates to 15 orphan students sponsored. Students and our extended supporters should all be so proud of this achievement and the difference it has and will make to their lives. The trip has created so many long-lasting memories for all concerned.



This year Mike & Joy were thrilled to see how well the students embraced the special school students and their interaction with them. It was fabulous to see the smiles that they brought to the faces of the young people there when they joined them in their activities and classrooms.





There were certainly some special moments and very close bonds made this year and you can see for yourselves from these pictures the smiles on both Klang and Port students faces and what a happy

time they had.


Playground equipment Port community donated in 2015





Students also had a go at learning to play the traditional Malay Angklung. The Angklung is a musical instrument made of a varying number of bamboo tubes attached to a bamboo frame. The tubes are carved to have a resonant pitch when struck and are tuned to octaves, similar to Western hand-bells.







Students also help to plant new seeds and plants in the schools sustainable garden that they not only use for their own food and meals, but also sell to shops and the local community. The garden has flourished over the last several years with chilis, zucchini, spinach, bananas, papaya, moringa, corn, bok choy to name just a few things.















One of the projects that we all undertook this year was to revamp the rusty entrance gates. So it was a chance to get hot, sweaty and dirty sanding, cleaning and painting the gates.










It was a fantastic job by the Port students in the renovations of the gates. It really has brightened up the front entrance to Klang Special School with two great new signs donated by Port also.



Later in the evening of Day 3, the crew headed to the very ornate Sri Mahamariamman Hindu temple at I-city Shah Alam.



The Sri Mahamariamman Temple is the oldest Hindu temple in Kuala Lumpur, Malaysia. Founded in 1873, it is situated at edge of Chinatown in Jalan Bandar (formerly High Street). In 1968, a new structure was built, featuring the ornate 'Raja Gopuram' tower in the style of South Indian temples. From its foundation, the temple provided an important place of worship for early Indian immigrants. It is now an important cultural and national monument.













As well as the meal, PJ club members interviewed the students to ask them about their time in Malaysia and have produced a dinner meeting newsletter where we all feature.







Day 4 - Petronas Towers, Central Market & Petaling St Markets

This year we managed to pre book tickets for the Petronas Twin Towers and students were able to head up to the skybridge and the observation deck and despite a few wobbly legs and a very hazy day, it was still an awesome experience for everyone.




The towers were designed by Argentine architect César Pelli. Planning on the Petronas Towers started on 1 January 1992 and included rigorous tests and simulations of wind and structural loads on the design. Seven years of construction followed, beginning on 1 March 1993 with the excavation. This involved moving 500 truckloads of earth every night to dig down 30 metres (98ft) below the surface. The 88-floor towers are constructed largely of reinforced concrete, with a steel and glass facade designed to resemble motifs found in Islamic art, a reflection of Malaysia's Muslim religion.

















Petaling Street is a Chinatown located in Kuala Lumpur, Malaysia. Haggling is a common sight here and the place is usually crowded with locals as well as tourists. The area has dozens of restaurants and food stalls, serving local favourites such as Hokkien mee, Ikan Bakar (barbecued fish), asam laksa and curry noodles. Traders here are mainly Chinese but there are also Indian, Malay, and Bangladeshi traders.




Port students had a look at all the fake goods, as well as experiencing the smells and culture of the numerous stalls.

Day 5 - Slim River Orang Asli Kampung

After an action-packed few days at the school and around Kuala Lumpur, it was time to head off for some more cultural experiences in the Cameron Highlands, stopping at Slim River Orang Asli Village (Kampung) and Kellles Castle on the way to our now regular spot in Gopeng Rainforest.



Port students had food hampers, toys, musical instruments and games to donate and villagers put on a warm welcome with music, song, dance and a feast of traditional foods.


















Day 5 - Kellies Castle & Arrival at Gopeng Rainforest Resort

Kellie's Castle is located in Batu Gajah, Kinta District, Perak, Malaysia. A Scottish planter named William Kellie Smith built the unfinished ruined mansion. Kellie's Castle was meant to be a home away from home for William Kellie Smith in the 20th Century. Being far away from home, Kellie desired his new residence to be reminiscent of his home back in Scotland. The castle is perched on top of a hill in what used to be a rubber plantation estate.



William Kellie Smith was an interesting man who was popular with his South Indian workers. Kind at heart, he erected a Hindu shrine for his workers on the castle premises. As a token of appreciation, his workers erected a statue of Kellie complete with a white suit and hat. Construction of this unique castle began in 1915. However, it came to an abrupt halt with Kellie's sudden death in 1926. The solitary castle looks almost surreal in these wild plantations of Perak and it projects a strong personality and an aura of mystery.







After a hot and sticky day on the road, we all arrived at Gopeng and our accommodation for the next few nights. Gopeng is set in the tranquility of the Cameron Highlands and is truly Idyllic.



Gopeng is a small town located about 18km south of Ipoh & 16km north of Kampar in Perak State, Malaysia. It is about 200km north of Malaysia's capital, Kuala Lumpur.





The rainforest is blessed with rich natural environmental surroundings. With many crystal clear rivers, streams, local and native villages, orchards, nearby caves, waterfalls, flora and fauna, it is a harmonious blend of nature and diversity providing the perfect getaway to nature and eco-adventure.





While trekking in the nearby Malaysian rainforest, we were rewarded with the unique sightings of the world's largest flower, the rare Rafflesia, beautiful Rajah Brooke butterflies, giant stick insects and many others. This vast area is a paradise for nature lovers and adventurers to explore further.





Day 6 - Gopeng Rainforest - White Water Rafting

Our first full day consisted of white water rafting and abseiling down a waterfall certainly not for the faint hearted!!



On the river, students had the thrills of tackling rapids and paddling down clear water amidst lush rainforest and passing some old rehabilitated tin mining sites. Having had heavy tropical rains the day before meant the waterfall really was in full flow, which made it a challenging descent for all those brave enough to give it a go.







After an exhausting day on the river, its always fun to have a truck ride back to camp through the jungle whilst dodging the overhanging palm leaves.



Later that afternoon after a much needed lunch and rest, we headed to the nearby Ulu Geroh Orang Asli Settlement to have a tour around and learn about traditional village life.



Most of their dwellings, called "wind screens," are made from jungle materials, such as bamboo, wood, leaves, sticks, and rattan. A very simple dwelling usually consists of a small and rather narrow sleeping platform. However, others, such as the Temiar, live in longhouses. Every longhouse has a number of divisions or compartments, each with a separate hearth or fireplace.



Students were treated to some traditional food, tour of their homes, learned about their native ways as well as having fun learning to shoot a blow pipe in a very competitive and thrilling competition. Georgina took out the contest with Lionel in a very close second place. To finish, they all tried out traditional fishing using just a bamboo, line and hook.



Day 7 - Gopeng - Gua Tempurung Cave & Ulu Geroh Waterfall Abselling

Before leaving Gopeng, it was time for some caving at Gua Tempurung. A new addition to this year's excursion was a challenge but also a very big hit. These amazing limestone caves at first seemed a bit tourist like, however that was levels 1 & 2. Level 3 turned hard-core and put students through their paces having to crawl through muddy wet water to get through the cave system.



Tempurung Cave (Malay: Gua Tempurung) is a cave in Gopeng, Perak, Malaysia, it is concealed within this limestone massif is an intricate system of caves of various dimensions honeycombed inside the limestone hills.



It is popular among spelunkers, or caving enthusiasts. More than 3 km long, it is one of the longest caves in Peninsula Malaysia. Part of it has been developed as a show cave with electric lighting and walkways and there are a range of tours of different lengths and difficulty. A fine river cave, the river passage runs about 1.6 km through the hill. There are three very large chambers and some spectacular stalactites and stalagmites.

As if the morning caving was not enough, the afternoon's activity of abseiling activity started with traveling to Ulu Geruntum in an open truck ride through narrow village roads. Upon reaching there, a short safety briefing was conducted by professional guides.




During the afternoon students abseiled down the rock face of a lush rainforest waterfall with water splashing over all parts of their body and when they never thought it was possible to go down, that was where the challenge began. It was a truly an invigorating experience pushing their fears to the limits.

Day 9 - Batu Caves, Istana Negara (Kings Palace) & Independence Square

Batu Caves is a limestone hill that has a series of caves, and cave temples in Gombak, Selangor, Malaysia. It takes its name from the Sungai Batu (Batu River), which flows past the hill and also it is the tenth (Pattu in Tamil) limestone hill from Ampang. Batu Caves is also the name of the nearby village.





The cave is one of the most popular Hindu shrines outside India and Is dedicated to Lord Murugan. It is the focal point of the Hindu festival of Thaipusam in Malaysia.










We were lucky enough to take a drive by the Kings Royal Palace (Istana Negara) and a few of the students fancied themselves as the newest members of the Royal guards.



The Istana Negara is the official residence of the Yang di-Pertuan Agong, the monarch of Malaysia. It is located along Jalan Tuanku Abdul Halim in Segambut, northwestern Kuala Lumpur. The palace opened in 2011 and replaced the old Istana Negara, which was located in central Kuala Lumpur.















As we headed into central Kuala Lumpur, we passed some of the historical buildings on the way to the Petronas Twin Towers. The Sultan Abdul Samad is a late nineteenth century building located along Jalan Raja in front of the Dataran Merdeka (Independence Square) and the Royal Selangor Club in Kuala Lumpur, Malaysia.




The building originally housed the offices of the British colonial administration, and was known simply as Government Offices in its early years. In 1974 it was renamed after Sultan Abdul Samad, the reigning sultan of Selangor at the time when construction began.



Day 10 - Sunway Lagoon

After a very bust schedule, it was time for some fun and relaxing at Malaysia largest theme park. Sunway Lagoon is like Adventure World on steroids with a water park, wildlife park, thrill seeking rides and Nickelodeon themed park all in one place.

Day 11 - Klang School - Farewells and Donations

Klang School proved to be a very special place for us all once again this year and sadly it was time to start saying our goodbyes. However, our wider Port community had once again achieved something very special in being able to donate 40,000RM, approximately \$15,000 that would sponsor orphan students to attend Klang Special School once again. On top of that some amazing artwork by Dionne and Jami was donated as well as 19 lpads thanks to PRA Computers in Perth.



Memories have been created, emotional tears have been shed and lifelong friendships, and stories are ingrained in the minds of all the 2019 Malaysia crew. These photos being shared in this newsletter, tell a small tale of how that has happened and come about and how this 2019 crew have made it a very special excursion for everyone concerned.



Klang School offers a variety of programs to the special needs students starting with the Early intervention program which offers educational programs to under 6 year olds. Then there is the school program, which focuses on 7-17 years olds and is broken down into 4 levels.



There is also the vocational program that introduces: Sewing, Handicraft, Living skills, Academic (Mathematics, Malay, English and Social Moral) and other activities such as Swimming, Computer Skills, Recreational Activities, Chess Club, Horse Riding, Educational Outings and Sports.



There is also a specialty service such as the physiotherapy room that offers invaluable and often unaffordable resources to the students and their families through volunteer physio's that aim to help improve their student's quality of life and mobility.

Lastly there is the Sheltered Workshop program targeted toward students that have completed the vocational program. There is a probation period of 3 months with paid work offered including: assembling, packaging, labeling, sorting, quality control, loading and unloading of goods.
