

PRINCIPAL'S REPORT

BARRY FINCH

At Port we continually strive for excellence and our journey over the last 9 years has been both busy and successful. Our achievements have included growing our staff numbers from 12 to 45. I would say increasing student support/staffing by:

- The addition of new facilities, creating a range of new options for students.
- Becoming a Registered Training Organisation, a provider of nationally recognised training courses, offering varied, flexible and accredited learning options.
- The creation of a centre for young mothers and their babies.
- The establishment of a highly successful Middle School, catering for Years 8 and 9.
- An increase in our capacity to support students offsite with the development of our Mobile Classroom and Outreach programmes.

Throughout these developments, we have maintained a continuous supportive and caring environment. Port has seen many students flourish with enhanced self-belief, an ability to achieve academically and the opportunity to leave school with improved work and study opportunities. The success that Port has achieved in reengaging students is now widely recognised. This has resulted in us, regrettably, having to close our doors to new enrolment enquiries until July 2020. We currently have places for 25 new students and a waitlist of over 70. One of the toughest Jobs for the administration team is telling a concerned family that we do not have room for their child.

Students in the Middle School are achieving exceptional academic success. These results are due to the raised expectations of students and their families, exceptional data-driven direct instruction teaching and a subsequent average attendance rate exceeding 90%. Success in any learning environment stems from having a group of students who attend regularly, who work as a group and who constantly build on what they have learnt. Working as a group maximises the use of our outstanding teaching team and radically increases how much each student retains.

Port becoming an RTO has allowed students to work at their own pace when at school. These nationally recognised courses and qualifications enable our students to achieve good solld outcomes. They don't, always support students in achieving a more generic rounded education, this impacts on the education experience of our more regular attending students, who are all working individually, and not as a group.

Next year, students with an attendance greater than 75% will be grouped in classes that allow them to maximise their education time and to leave school with higher grades and more skills to learn independently.

These students will engage in specific classes in English, Maths and Health & Wellbeing, as well as being supported to complete their Certificate courses.

Students with an attendance of less than 75% will continue their learning as they do now. Students with attendance under 50% will need to come to school with a parent/guardian to discuss the viability of continued enrolment. Support will always be given to any student who has a legitimate reason for low attendance.

Due to the high demand for places at Port School, it is time to raise levels of expectation regarding attendance and engagement. Port students have golden opportunities, but they must earn that right through engagement, or consider making room for someone else to fill their spot.

Mobile Phone Code - After years of asking students to use their mobile phones appropriately, with limited success, it has been decided that student mobile phone use at school will no longer be allowed. Students will be asked to turn off their mobile phone and put it away before they enter the school gate and to not bring it out until they leave school at the end of the day. If a phone, or earbuds, are seen by staff, they will be asked to hand it in and may collect it again at the end of the day. Not having a mobile phone will be tough for many to begin with, but research has shown that this initiative will eventually reduce conflict, increase work output and give students a break from what has become addictive behaviour, that of constantly checking their phones.

Dress Code - A recent student survey has shown an inconsistent ruling on what is, and what is not, appropriate clothing at school. Many students who have followed the guidelines feel that it is unfair that others get away with continually wearing inappropriate clothing. This has become an issue mainly due to a few grey areas around what is appropriate dress. To help give clarity, from the start of next year the minimum dress requirement for students will be the coverage of a t-shirt and no very short skirts or pants, nor skin-tight pants. Please also be reminded that shoes must be enclosed. Port School polo shirts are currently available at 50% of the cost price. School uniforms are not, and will not be a requirement, but school appropriate dress will be strictly enforced.

Please ensure that your child comes to school dressed appropriately, according to the guidelines, or else they will be sent home to change.

Most students come to Port with an academic gap. These initiatives are about closing that gap and sending our graduates into the world with as many tools for success as possible. I look forward to you getting on board with us for this exciting journey.

Our staff and wider community of supporters have fully engaged in fundralsing for this, with the now annual art exhibition, trivia night, sausage sizzles and the upcoming new concert in conjunction with Perth Male Voice Choir planned for April 2020.

Although I am not as hands-on with students as I once was, I feel my experiences now lie with the leadership and running of the school alongside a great board, principal and team of people. I am delighted to be implementing a variety of capital expansion initiatives across various geographic areas of our ever-growing campus. Having just completed the annual report for last year as well as this newsletter, it exhausts me to see how much is going on. We truly offer our students a wide variety of educational, vocational and holistic experiences and more than ever, our students are walking away armed with the best possible opportunities to transition into further education, training or employment.



I would like to thank everyone who has played a part in my 10-year Port journey, as friends, colleagues, parents/guardians or students, there has been fun had, tears shed and emotional highs and lows. Despite the 1-hour commute each day, Port has been and continues to be a very special place for me.

For the third year in a row we continued our annual journey south to Nowanup to spend a week with Noongar Elder Eugene Eades. This camp is an opportunity for our young men to escape the bright lights, busy schedules and social media notifications for a few days to bond together and learn some of the ancient knowledge bound up in this country.



For those who don't know, Nowanup is a small property located about 450kms south-east of Perth, not too far from Bremer Bay. Eugene has been regenerating the land down there for nearly 20 years and over the course of his journey has found that through healing the land he is healing people.







We spent the week sharing stories, fishing, chasing yongas and kardas, making tap sticks and walking sticks from local wood, climbing Bluff Knoli, all while eating, drinking, laughing and crying. For a lot of the boys it was well out of their comfort zones, and unfortunately for a couple of them, they did not make it through the whole week. With those boys we will continue to work through the issues and hopefully they will come back bigger and stronger next year.





The remaining 10 boys had an incredible week. A lot of the boys really rose up and it was inspiring to see them behave so respectfully to each other, to Eugene, to us staff, and to the whole experience. For our young men, whose modern lives don't allow for much ritual and rites of passage, the camp has become a really valuable and important part of the annual calendar.

BUILDING PROJECT UPDATES

It all started one morning as the Aiswa Capital Works grant funded extension to the Young Parent Centre finally began. Four years on, we are having to expand and double in size to accommodate the growth we have seen and the need for additional and varied work areas.







It's been a journey getting the appropriate compliance, but now it's all systems go for Devco and the team. The new build will see a state-of-the-art teaching and training room, manager's office, student support services room and a semi-commercial training kitchen, as well as new and additional toilet facilities.











With a deadline of 29th January, the Devco team are certainly keeping the pace up to ensure the new facilities are ready for staff and students in 2020.





With the slab down at the beginning of November and the electrics moved underground, the timeline is looking good.

As with most classic car restoration projects, it is certainly not a job for the faint-hearted. However, with many of Port's staff having mechanical and classic car experience, there is a lot of support for students to achieve in this newly added automotive area.



To add value to the workshop, Phil has secured a \$3,000 community grant thanks to the City of Cockburn. This will help with additional automotive and workshop equipment and tools, as well as helping to fund the restoration.








Animals, Animals, Animals have been the Certificate II in Visual Art students focus this term.


































MALAYSIA ORPHAN SPONSORSHIP UPDATES





However, sometimes our coping skills need a bit of a rebuild. The holiday period could be a good opportunity to try something new, such as journalling, a walk in nature, trialling a new hobby or interest, or deliberately engaging in activities that bring us a sense of pride and achievement.

2019 has been a busy year, with counselling services continuing to offer student support, counselling and advocacy for a range of issues relating to school, family, personal crises, mental health and wellbeing. A common thread amongst members of the counselling team is a deep appreciation for client-centred support and the crucial role of developing a strong therapeutic relationship. This is characterised by trust, empathy and holding a positive regard to facilitate self-reflection, and helping students to identify any necessary steps towards change.

For 2020 we have ambitions to improve the counselling service, with more group programs targeted towards specific student needs, and building connections with outside agencies which offer specific and specialist support. We aim to be more integrated with broader student services at Port School going into 2020 in an effort to be more accessible and offer a comprehensive model of student support.



From the counselling team, we wish you and your families a happy holiday period. We would like to extend a special mention to all departing students, wishing them the best for their future journey. We look forward to welcoming back existing students and new students commencing at Port School in 2020. Best wishes.

As usual, it was a busy semester in the workshop. We have a few of our Certificate II in Furniture students completing their qualification with the making of some very nice solid jarrah wall cabinets. These included some complex joinery and hardware fitting and the pieces are the culmination of this qualification. Well done girls, a solid effort.





This semester the workshop has also purchased a 1976 Series 3 Land Rover. This vehicle has spent the last 40-odd years on a farm in Manjimup and was purchased by Port School as it is a very basic vehicle with simple systems and so is perfect to introduce skills around brakes, electrics, the drive chain, panel beating and general automotive parts. They are very rugged vehicles and ours is now completely torn down. One student, Jackson, is working with Tim Murphy on the refurbishment of the motor and gearbox. Another student, Flynn, has been fabricating the metal parts of the vehicle that needed replacing.



It is an iconic vehicle and several teachers have already voiced their desire to purchase it once refurbished, however, the aim is to perhaps add it to the school fleet, possibly as a vehicle for our maintenance crew. 



Christmas BAKING

Let us do it for you!

3-Ingredient Christmas Swirl Fudge



ingredients


- 340g white vanilla baking chips
- 400g creamy vanilla frosting
- green and red gel food colours

Method

- a) Line 8-inch square pan with foil, leaving foil overhanging at 2 opposite sides of pan; spray foil with cooking spray.
- b) In large microwavable bowl, microwave white chips uncovered on High 1 minute. Spoon frosting over chips. Microwave on High 30 seconds; stir. If necessary, continue to microwave in 15-second increments until mixture can be stirred smooth.
- c) Place 3/4 cup fudge mixture into each of 2 small bowls, leaving remaining untinted fudge mixture in bowl. Tint 1 bowl green and 1 bowl red by stirring in each food color to desired color.
- d) Drop heaped tablespoons of green, red and white fudge mixture in bottom of pan to create random pattern. Pull table knife through layers for marbied design. Refrigerate uncovered until set, about 1 hour.
- e) Remove from pan by lifting foll; peel foil away. Cut into 8 rows by 8 rows. Store covered in refrigerator.

The fudge mixture will start to set up quickly, so make sure you have everything ready, and work quickly.



Certificate III in Aviation (Cabin Crew)

Two of our students are currently undertaking a very exciting certificate in aviation. Jorja Kiely and Kacee Thorne both attend this this course for two days a week based at South Metro TAFE in Jandakot. The expectations are high, and as you can see from the pictures, it's both fun and educational and provides amazing potential career pathways in various areas of aviation.

When they complete the Certificate III in Aviation (Cabin Crew) they will be recruitment-ready for a career as a flight attendant or cabin crew member. The students gain valuable experience and skills in emergency response drills, first aid, responsible service of beverages, teamwork and customer service, and preparation for cabin duties. They learn how to deal with difficult passengers on an aircraft with crew member security training.






South Metropolitan TAFE has a Boeing 737 that is used for most of the practical training. The fun begins with practical exercises such as evacuating down a slide, simulated cabin fires with a smoke machine, firefighting, ditching and life raft training. The students receive hands-on instruction in the full-length cabin with business and economy class seating, fully operational galleys, cabin service equipment and PA system.





South Metropolitan TAFE's fully equipped hangar at the AeroSpace Training Centre at Jandakot Airport also has various aircraft engines, workshop stations, computer facilities, a flight simulator, and a number of other aircraft.





Graduates of this course have been employed by regional and international airlines as cabin crew members. Students need to be fit and healthy in order to complete the airlines emergency procedure training, and a prerequisite for the course is being able to swim a minimum of 50m unaided and fully clothed. Students must provide a swimming certificate in order to demonstrate they meet the prerequisite and can therefore participate in the water training.





Some of the core units for this course are listed below:

- Apply aircraft safety procedures
- Apply aviation work health and safety procedures
- Maintain the safety of people and aircraft
- Respond to abnormal and emergency situations in an aircraft
- Work effectively in the aviation industry
- Manage disruptive behaviour and unlawful interference with aviation
- Apply and monitor aviation workplace security procedures
- Maintain security awareness and vigilance in an aviation workplace
- Organise personal work priorities and development
- Prepare workplace documents
- Operate firefighting equipment
- Undertake emergency response action to a security threat

TeamSport

Our team sport program is like no other. Yes, we play a mixture of your regular team-orientated games like netball, flag rugby and Aussie Rules footy but most of the time we play a range of unique games that have been refined through the semesters.



At a glance they may appear to be a strange mash-up of multiple sports but if you watch long enough you'll discover the games to be a complementary amalgamation of different sports. For example:

- 'Brandy': this is a mix-up of Tee-Ball and Brandy riddled with quirky little rules and variants.
- 'Handball-Netball': you could say this is like netball but there are no fixed positions and we use a
 rubbery ball, not much larger than a grapefruit. Points can be scored by hitting any part of the ring
 or net. We also play it indoor, surrounded by nets, so the ball can be bounced off any netted wall
 above or on the side.
- 'Gaelic Football': this is not too dissimilar to real Gaelic but points are scored in a similar fashion to American Football and there is no running with the ball. Sometimes we also like to use a Frisbee instead of the round ball.

Next year, students participating in POP will be required to engage weekly in an outcome-based review, electing areas of improvement that they will need to demonstrate as a requirement of the program. These outcomes are based on the minimum expected behaviours students need to demonstrate before they can transition to the mainstream school and will be reflected in the biannual student report. The POP will be implementing the new 'Code of Conduct' and 'Protective Behaviours Curriculum' in 2020 and there will be some changes made to the service delivery agreements and procedural operations, which will comply with the requirements of new legislation.



We have had a very positive term on Outreach, with a very impressive work ethic from the students I work with. It has been a great learning journey for all. Tasha has been able to reach goals that were set at the beginning of the year and create new goals for the New Year. Well done Tasha; an amazing job.
