DEPUTY PRINCIPAL'S REPORT

I know I have said it a lot this year, but I really was so proud and privileged to be part of such an awesome team, achieving an incredible 25 for 25 target throughout this year. To see our Port staff and students working on such an amazing fundraising project and event was incredible. To see our community of friends, parents, carers, guardians, neighbours and associated partner organisations and agencies all attending the 2018 art exhibition, just blew me away. By my calculations we had over 300 people come through the doors and it didn't let up from 5pm until 8-30pm, when we were kicking them out!!



No matter how big or small a part you have all played, please, please realise how much of a difference you will make to the lives of these 25 orphan students in Klang. Many live in large overcrowded group care homes with minimal funding and food; many sleep and live in one shared room with little or no education, sports or fun things to do during the days.



Funding a student to attend Klang Special School for 1-year costs \$800. It gets them out of their care home 5 days a week. It gives them a school uniform, provides their daily meals throughout the whole is the and, most importantly, gives them a sense of purpose and meaning, and an

education that includes sports, arts, computing, numeracy and literacy, swimming, cooking and gardening. For some of the older students it also gives access to vocational paid work in the sheltered workshop, helping them to be more sustainable and independent.

On top of that, it also gives some of the younger and more severely mentally and physically disabled children access to much needed physiotherapy and appropriate medical treatments. So, whether it was \$1, \$50, \$800, or indeed your invaluable time, you, your friends and your families have all made a massive difference.

If you find yourselves in Malaysia, please take time to visit Klang Special School and see what you and we, as a school community, are part of. This has been a 7 year journey and relationship and everywhere you look in Klang School you see something of Port: sculptures, paintings, pictures, playground equipment, books, toys, games and sponsored students. It is wonderful to see and know what we have all achieved. Over 60 of our students have been part of that journey, and probably over 500 in the wider context. I hope that they will all take away how special this is and what they have also been part of, whether that's now or as they get older. There will always be a warm welcome from Klang staff, students and the Apex Club of Klang for any Port staff, students. families who would like to visit in their own time from. Just let me know and I will set it up. Trust me, you will not be disappointed.

Lastly, the enormity of what we all do got to me on the night when a Port student's Mum and Nan handed me \$800, thanking everyone at Port for all they do and adding that this donation for a Klang School orphan student was a way of saying thank you. Later on, a staff member said she and her family and friends collected \$800 and would be sponsoring a child. The owners and directors of Devco (our Builders) sponsored a child and bought nearly enough artwork to sponsor another. Several other staff members have also got together with their families, work colleagues to do the same. On the night, my son bought the \$50 Nike Boot artwork for himself then came up to me and asked, "Does that help Dad?" (teardrops at that point).

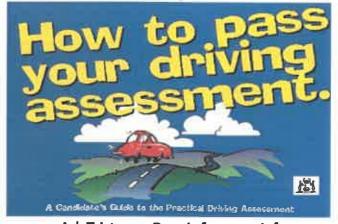

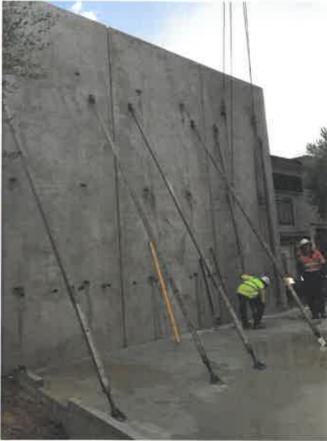

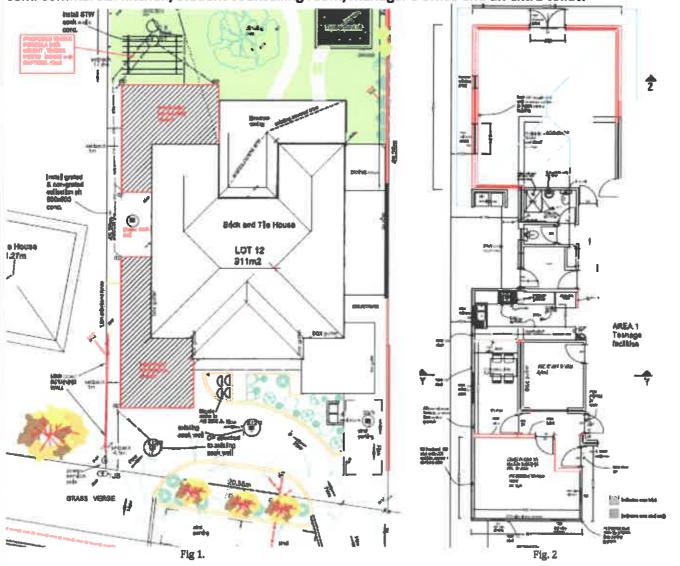

The Main Roads Land development is ticking away. There are some final lease agreements and management orders that need to be finalised prior to putting in the planning application for the fitness centre, Middle School classroom and bus garage. This will change the look and feel of the school, as well as giving yet more arms to Port's educational offerings.



The Young Parent Centre is eagerly waiting to hear the results of an AISWA Capital Works Grant for a \$300k proposed addition to the centre. If successful, the project, which is supported by the Board and Principal, would double the capacity of young mums and include an additional much larger classroom, semi commercial kitchen, student counselling room, manager's office and an extra toilet.

I know the boys had a great time, and we look forward to heading back again soon.

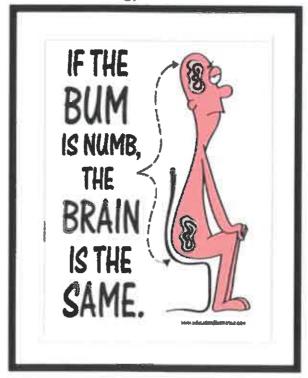

You may struggle finding motivation, or staying motivated for exercise. Think about ways you can make exercise part of your daily routine and lifestyle. Choose something you enjoy, and ask your friends or family to help motivate you and to keep you on track. If you own a dog, take it for walks in your local area. Construction

It has been a busy term for the workshop with Paul completing a 20-seat Jarrah staffroom table. Lots of students assisted in this project, from the hand cutting of the thick veneers and vacuum pressing these onto the substrate, through to the attachment of the side pieces, finishing with a hand rubbed natural oil. A great job done by all in the making of a table that commercially would have cost us \$15,000 or more to purchase. Much more importantly, it is a great showcase for what staff and students are capable of with a little planning and commitment. Well done to all involved.







This term, a number of students showed an interest in mechanical work: we embarked on re-engineering and refurbishing a motorised go-kart. We are modifying the frame and reworking or restoring all the systems, including the motor, electrics, steering and braking systems. At the conclusion of this project we hope to have a small gymkhana to test the skills of all the students who have worked on the project.

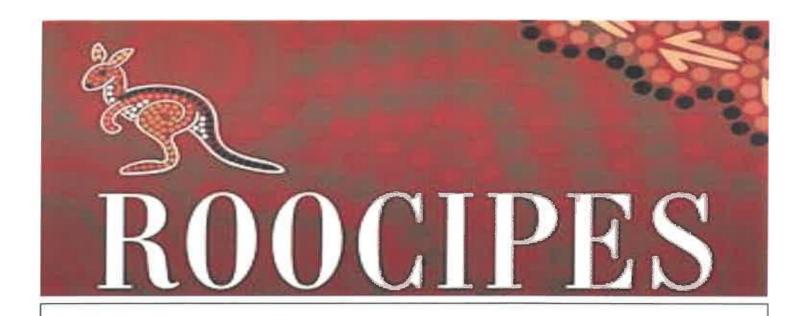

THAI RED KANGAROO CURRY

INGREDIENTS

- 1 litre brown chicken stock
- 2 tablespoons red Thal curry paste
- 1 tablespoon chopped garlic
- 1 tablespoon chopped ginger
- 1 brown onion finely diced
- 2 tins coconut cream only (do not use milk)
- 1 lime juiced
- 1 tablespoon palm sugar
- 2 tablespoons fish sauce
- 6 kaffir lime leaves
- 2kg diced Kangaroo rump

METHOD

In a little oil cook the onion, ginger and garlic then add the curry paste and cook for a few minutes being careful to stir frequently. Then add the diced Kangaroo meat and seal before adding the chicken stock, bring to the boil and skim. Cover and simmer gently until tender (approx 1 hour). Then add the fish sauce, palm sugar, lime and leaves, coconut cream and simmer for another 15-20 minutes.

GARNISH

100 grams Red onion (large dice)

100 grams Red pepper (large dice)

100 grams Fine green beans (blanched)

100 grams Cherry tomatoes Halved

100 grams Pineapple chunks

10 grams Corlander leaves (chopped roughly)

METHOD

In a non-stick pan sauté the onion until opaque then add the red pers, cook a little more. Then add the green beans and scorch. Then add to the kangaroo curry with the tomatoes and pineapple. Garnish with some rough cut coriander leaves. Serve with steamed Jasmin rice.

Below: Ashleigh Nelson — West Australian Olympic star and Hockey Gold and Silver medalist, spoke to students about her mental health journey as she adjusted to all the demands and challenges of entering the world of elite sport. She was extremely honest in openly discussing her own struggies with depression and anxiety, but also delivered a message of ultimate hope, making it clear that there are always support networks & action plans available to tackle any mental health issue that young people may experience.





Port students who participated were extremely well behaved and attentive, and a credit to their school and families.

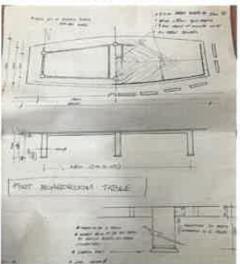

CIRCLE OF SECURITY

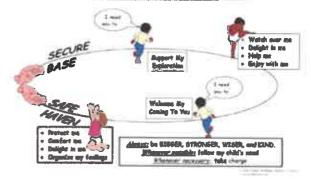

PROFESSIONAL DEVELOPMENT (PD)

During the term our educators have been lucky enough to participate in various PD's to extend their knowledge. Kathy has been learning about the role of an Educational Leader, Klaudz has done a PD on 'Meaningful Compliance' and Chennelle has completed a PD on 'Embedding Indigenous Culture'. Kathy and Emily have also attended a 2-day staff PD at Port School and participated in team building exercises as well as listened to some great presentations on domestic violence, dyslexia, autism and OHS in the work place.

ELC SCIENCE WEEK

During Science Week the children could engage, explore, wonder, investigate and be curious about their learning environments. 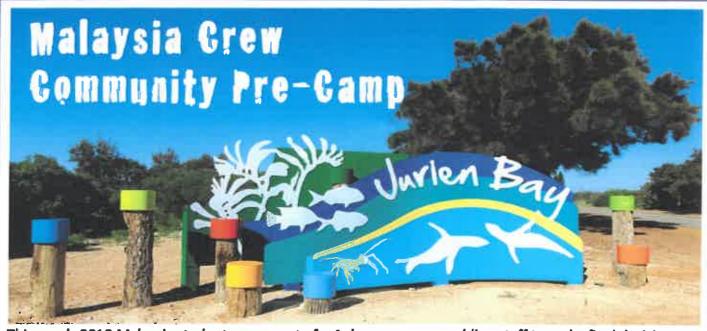

PLAYGROUP

We continue to have informal discussions with the parents about our policies and procedures. We have received some great feedback and questions.



Jenny has continued with Rhyme Time sessions each fortnight and the children are super excited to see what resources she has brought with her. Each visit we learn new songs and participate in different activities. On the weeks Jenny doesn't come to the Centre the mums can participate in various activities that promote a positive relationship between them and their child/children. These activities usually involve paint and getting very messy ⁽³⁾



This year's 2018 Malaysia students were part of a 4-day pre-camp enabling staff to make final decisions on group dynamics and who should or shouldn't be going to Malaysia. The intense few days saw the students work in close proximity with each other while undertaking a community project at Apex Camp Jurien. They had to live, sleep, work and cook together and show they could pull together cohesively as a team. They also had the opportunity to take in the sights of the Dandaragan and Coorow Shires and visit Greenhead, Leeman, Cockleshell Gully and Mt Lesueur National Park.



Projects pushed boundaries with several students having the courage to climb one of the park's two Mesas to its peak: a 6km challenging rocky climb. Mt Lesueur is one of the most bio-diverse areas in Australia, indeed the world. Lesueur National Park covers 26,987 hectares and is recognised for its outstanding conservation, landscape and recreational importance. It is home to over 900 plant species.





'Andrew Lock's - School Journey to Success'

For as long as Andrew has been at school, even starting in Kindy at age 4, Andrew found it difficult to find a place where he belonged. Having difficulties with learning and social anxiety, these things have prevented him from wanting to be at school.

Finally, in 2015, he left mainstream school and, after trying two alternative schools, his then school psychologist suggested we go to Port School. We met with Principal Barry and he was willing to give Andrew a trial at Port. This would prove to be a turning point in Andrew's schooling. He faced an almost 4 hour bus and train trip daily, but within the first year he achieved the highest school attendance in his whole schooling and, as parents, we were amazed at his dedication to travel that far.

Andrew's whole attitude change when he started at Port. He had a great rapport with teachers, staff and students, and was willing to step out of his comfort zone and try new things, even eating foods he would have never have tried before. The teachers and staff not only helped Andrew, but our whole family, and we are all very grateful for their love and support. Thank you to Port School for giving Andrew so many great opportunities to find his way in life.

MATHEMATICS

In Mathematics this term, students who are not undertaking a CGEA course have continued to work on mental maths skills, as well as fractions and decimals. Students have been completing worksheets, playing maths games and engaging in online learning, in order to strengthen their knowledge in these areas.



Term 3 has been a busy term, with many extra curricular activities disrupting regular classes. However, CGEA students have persisted with their steady pace of work. The CGEA coursework has been designed to prepare our students for real world problems by equipping them with skills they will need once they leave school and enter the workforce. As previously mentioned, CGEA I contains four workbooks: with the first two dealing with money and direction. The third book focuses on measurement. In this workbook, students are introduced to different methods of measurement and are shown how to measure various things. including perimeter, area and time. The time section of this workbook is especially important, as it draws attention to the challenges students may encounter when moving into the workforce, such as organising public transport and taking outside influences into account when managing time.

With the school year coming to an end next term, I look forward to seeing students stepping it up and completing even more work; especially students who will be leaving at the end of the year, as they move towards achieving their CGEA qualifications.

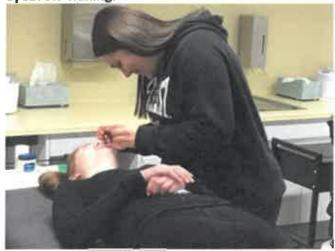


CERT II IN BEAUTY

At the end of the day they left feeling well and truly pampered.



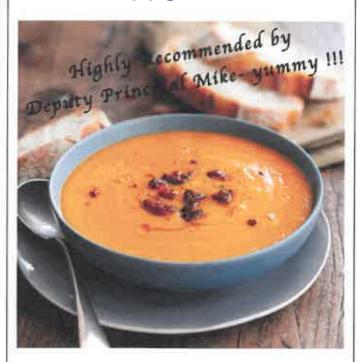

YOUNG PARENT CENTRE TOP RECIPE

Sweet Potato and Chorizo soup

Ingredients

- 1 tsp oil, plus extra to garnish
- 75 g (3oz) chorizo, skinned and chopped
- 1 onion, chopped
- 1 g large garlic clove, finely chopped
- 750 g (1lb 11oz) sweet potatoes, cut into rough 2.5cm (1in) pieces
- 1.1 (2 pint) hot vegetable or chicken stock
- 2 rosemary sprigs



Method

- 1. Heat the oil in a large pan and fry the chorizo until golden. Lift out with a slotted spoon on to a plate and set aside.
- 2. Gently fry the onion in the empty chorizo pan for 8-10min until softened, then add the garlic and fry for 1min more. Stir in the sweet potatoes and cover with the stock. Add the rosemary sprigs and bring to the boil, then turn down the heat and simmer for 10-15min until the potatoes are completely soft.
- 3. Pull out and discard the woody rosemary stalks (most of the leaves will have dropped into the soup). Use a hand blender to whiz the soup until smooth thinning with a little more stock or boiling water if it seems too thick. Season to taste, then divide among four warmed bowls. Garnish with the fried chorizo and a swirl of oil.

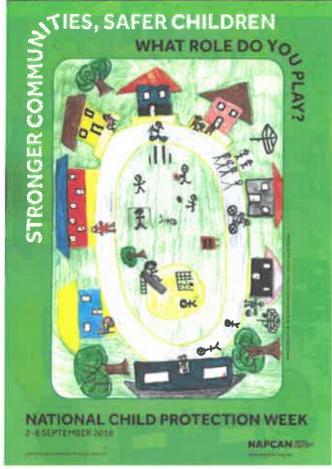


ART ROOM ANECDOTES
