Previous years have been a great success with many memories and many new Malaysian friends and contacts made. Eligible students had been identified at the start of the year and after expressions of interest, posters & parent evenings, natural attrition saw the numbers look at about fifteen potentials. As always, the heat and humidity hit the group immediately on arrival and it was off in our vehicle to check in at the Puteri Garden Hotel in Klang.






Day 2 - Melaka (Malacca)

It was an early start and away. This new addition to the excursion was certainly a great one. Malacca is a Malaysian state on the Malay Peninsula's southwest coast. The capital, Malacca City, has a colonial past seen in its preserved town centre, the site of 16th-century, Portuguese St. Paul's Church. It's also home to Christ Church, built by the Dutch in the 18th century. Next to Christ Church in Red Square is the Stadthuys, the Dutch-era town hall now housing a museum of Malaccan history and ethnography.











Students were hosted by a Melaka Apex Club member, who acted as a tour guide. Later in the day they treated the group to a pretty spicy Banana Leaf Curry!!







Whilst in Melaka, we helped to celebrate Christine's birthday with a traditional Nyonya meal, a river cruise and a small gift from the group.




Day 3 - Port Dickson & Kuala Lumpur

With approximately \$5,000 (15,000RM) we have replaced dangerous and outdated equipment with state of the art new facilities for the many children to play on. It was a very emotional opening ceremony, knowing we have once again made a big difference to others less fortunate than ourselves.



It was great to see Klang Special School students using the pool equipment that we bought on last year's trip. Thanks to sponsorship from Klang Apex Club and friends, the swimming pool is now back in action and an instructor has been funded to provide basic swimming lessons.



Day 6 – Heading to the Rainforest

After two fun packed days with the students and staff at Klang Special School, it was time to head off for some more cultural experiences in the Cameron Highlands, with a stop at Kellie's Castle en route to Gopeng Rainforest. Kellie's Castle is located in Batu Gajah, Kinta District, Perak, Malaysia. A Scottish planter named William Kellie Smith built the unfinished ruined mansion.





Kellie's Castle was meant to be a home away from home for William Kellie Smith in the 20th Century. Being far away from home, Kellie desired his new residence to be reminiscent of his home back in Scotland. The castle is perched on top of a hill in what used to be a rubber plantation estate.




William Kellie Smith was an interesting man who was popular with his South Indian workers. Kind at heart, he erected a Hindu shrine for his workers on the castle premises. As a token of appreciation, his workers erected a statue of Kellie complete with a white suit and hat.

Construction of this unique castle began in 1915. However, it came to an abrupt halt with Kellie's sudden death in 1926. The solitary castle looks almost surreal in these wild plantations of Perak and it projects a strong personality and an aura of mystery.

Recently, efforts have been made by the Perak State Government to rescue this magnificent structure

from the encroaching foliage. Besides being haunted, the castle is believed to have hidden rooms and secret underground tunnels. The road that leads to Kellie's Castle follows the contours of the land in a dizzying, maze-like fashion, adding to the mystery and romance of the place.





After a hot and sticky day on the road it was great to finally arrive at Gopeng and our accommodation for the next few nights. Gopeng is set in the tranquility of the Cameron Highlands and is truly idyllic.







And when it is hot and humid, there is nothing better than a cold river to cool us all down.



Gopeng is a small town located about 18km south of Ipoh and 16km north of Kampar in Perak of Malaysia. It is about 200km north of Malaysia's capital city, Kuala Lumpur. With the stressful life in the city and work pressures, more and more people yearn for the nature and the slow pace of life in the countryside.



Gopeng Rainforest is blessed with a rich natural environment surrounding. With many crystal clear rivers, streams, local and native villages, orchards, nearby caves, waterfalls, flora and fauna, it is a harmonious blend of nature and diversity to offer you the perfect getaway to nature and eco-adventure. With some trekking and adventure in the nearby Malaysian rainforest, we were rewarded with the unique sightings of the world's largest flower, the rare Rafflesia flower, the beautiful Rajah Brooke butterflies, the giant stick insect and many others. This vast area is a nature lovers and adventurous enthusiasts' paradise to explore further.





Our first night included a night hike with local Orang Asli tribal villagers, spotting some amazing creatures including large stick insects, bugs and chameleon lizards.

Day 7 & 8 - Gopeng Adventures
It was time to start some of the more adventurous challenges with white water rafting down the rainforest rapids, caving at Gua Tempurung and abseiling down a fast flowing waterfall.























Day 9 – Wisma Harapan & Petronas Towers

A new addition to the program this year was a visit to the Selangor Association Mentally Handicapped School in Kuala Lumpur called Wisma Harapan. A warm welcome was given to us all, with a short show and some songs by the students.





After that Port students were invited to take part in traditional basket weaving and stool making craft activities before having lunch and a few presentations.









Day 9 -Petronas Towers & Batu Caves

After a great time and having been truly spoiled at Wisma Harapan, it was time to head to the Petronas Towers. Sadly timings this year did not allow us to go to the top to the skybridge and viewing deck, but it was a glorious day to view from the ground & see this spectacular piece of engineering.



The towers were designed by Argentine architect César Pelli. Planning on the Petronas Towers started on 1 January 1992 and included rigorous tests and simulations of wind and structural loads on the design. Seven years of construction followed, beginning on 1 March 1993 with the excavation, which involved moving 500 truckloads of earth every night to dig down 30 metres (98ft) below the surface. The 88-floor towers are constructed largely of reinforced concrete, with a steel and glass facade designed to resemble motifs found in Islamic art, a reflection of Malaysia's Muslim religion.

As if the day wasn't packed enough, it was then on to see the amazing natural Batu Caves. Batu Caves is a limestone hill that has a series of caves and cave temples in Gombak, Selangor, Malaysia. It takes its name from the Sungai Batu (Batu River), which flows past the hill and also it is the tenth (Pattu in Tamil) limestone hill from Ampang. Batu Caves is also the name of a nearby village.



The cave is one of the most popular Hindu shrines outside India, and is dedicated to Lord Murugan. It is the focal point of Hindu festival of Thaipusam in Malaysia.

Day 10 - Sunway Lagoon

Sunway is a chill day and a chance for students to reflect on what they have been part of over the last ten days, whilst having a blast in one of Asia's biggest theme parks. With a massive water park, adventure theme park and wildlife park it offers an all day non stop range of activities.



In the evening it was time to head back for a steamboat dinner, which is often loved or hated!! Steamboat refers to several Asian varieties of stew, consisting of a simmering metal pot of stock at the centre of the dining table. Ingredients are placed into the pot and are cooked at the table. Dishes include thinly sliced meat, vegetables, mushrooms, wontons, egg dumplings, tofu & seafood.





Day 11 - Farewells

It is never easy leaving and as they say all good things come to an end, but not without creating a few more amazing memories. It was a chance to say final farewells to Klang School and present them with a few donations. Port raised over \$5,000 to donate to the new playground as well as raising nearly \$7,000 through Australian support to sponsor 8 orphan students for 1 years education at Klang school





It was sad to say goodbye to our good friends at the school, and after talking closely with staff there, we look forward to a great relationship in 2017 and beyond. Thanks must go out to the President of the Royal Klang Club and to Klang apex Club for hosting what was an amazing and memorable final evening for all. It was great to see Klang school staff and students join us at this event and close off what was a brilliant and unforgettable 11 days.

Apex Global Participation Award 2016

Port School is delighted to announce that after five years supporting Klang Special School in Malaysia, that they have won a Global Apex Project Award jointly with the Apex Club of Klang. The accolade acknowledged the support they have all given the school and the special three way international relationship that has developed over that time.

Mike Gilbert, Deputy Principal & Malaysia Coordinator from Port School, Perth was inducted as an Honorary Member of Klang Apex Club only two days before the award, for his international work over that time. Mike has served over 23 years in service groups including Round Table in the UK, Apex in Australia and more recently joining Mindarie Rotary Club in Perth, Western Australia.

Both he and Rovin Raj the Klang Apex Club President jointly accepted the sought after prestigious trophy by outgoing Global Chairman- Kate Huth at the Royal Port Dickson Yacht Club after beating other projects in India, Bangladesh, Malaysia, Fiji, Singapore, Philippines and Australia.







A spokesperson for Klang School and Selangor Association for Mentally Handicapped said, "We are delighted that the award has gone to such amazing recipients, Klang Apex Club have supported us since the 1980's and Apex Australia as an organisation since 2009. Mike & the Port School team took us on as a project in 2012 and have donated much need resources, equipment and funding over that period."

Port School has taken over ten students from its school near Fremantle each year for the last 5 years adding a cultural, leadership and international theme to their timetable. Port has made many friends over the journey and has had support and donations from far and wide. The highlight was in 2015, when Mike and the team were successful in gaining a Department of Foreign Affairs grant for \$17,500 that funded Port to go to Malaysia and six Klang Special School students and two teachers to be able to come to Perth on a trip of a lifetime.





By the time your reading this article, two Port staff and eight students, once again will have headed to Malaysia for another ten-day excursion and experience not to be forgotten. Taking in the cultural aspects of Malaysia, whilst helping out Klang Special School again. This year they have raised \$5,000 equating to 15,000RM (Malaysian Ringgits). The money will be going towards much needed, brand new outdoor play equipment to replace the rusty, dangerous and very outdated ones they currently have. Local Malaysian businessman and parent of a student, Mr. Kenny Yang has been helping to remove the old play equipment and get the area prepared for the new state of the art play facility.





The award and international accolade must go to all the friends, families and supporters of the initiative over the 5-year duration in both countries. Multiple people have been involved over the journey in this very special project between two amazing schools. Whilst there, National Apex President, Mathew O'Donnell also presented Klang School a cheque for \$11,271 from Apex Australia.
