



# MALAYSIA







Planning for the 2017 Malaysia excursion started in Term 2 with Mike Gilbert & Joy Cromwell heading up the trip once again. As always, Mike and Joy along with the Malaysian hosts, tried to add or introduce a new element each year. This excursion was no exception. Discussions around the historic town of Melaka versus a new addition of Penang further North ensued, as well as re-introducing an old favourite, Pulau Ketam (Crab Island). After much research, Melaka was chosen by the final team of students, along with many tried and tested venues such as the Gopeng Rainforest, Kuala Lumpur, Port Dickson and Kellie's Castle.

Previous years had been a great success, with many memories and many new Malaysian friends and contacts made. Eligible students had been identified at the start of the year and, after expressions of interest, posters & parent evenings, over twenty-five students were interested from the outset. Natural attrition saw the numbers decrease to fifteen potentials. That number ended up being whittled down to nine who finally went, including a Finnish Rotary exchange student, Kaisla Kainulainen.

At school Malaysia classes focused on:

- Planning the trip itinerary
- Liaising with Klang Apex Club
- Fundraising sausage sizzles, sponsorship letters, selling homemade cakes, pies & sausage rolls, an amazing art exhibition and a wonderful quiz night
- Booking hotels & flights

- Malaysian food experiences creating some tasty Nasi Lemak, Beef Redang and much more
- Workshop activities making chopping boards and a spectacular sculpture to take to Malaysia
- Buying Australian themed gifts for Klang Special School & Port Dickson New Life Care Home

## Day 1 - Leaving Perth

#### Day 2 - Pulau Ketam (Crab Island)

A 45-minute boat ride landed us on Pulau Ketam, a small traditional fishing village island with no transport other than push bike hire or walking. The bikes were dubious, to say the least, but improved on previous years. We had seen better ones on bulk rubbish around Fremantle!!! But then, \$15 for ten bikes all day, you can't ask for much I suppose!! It was a great day sightseeing on an unusual island. Most of the houses were on stilts due to it being on a flood plain.













#### Day 3 & 4 - Klang Special School

Klang Special School is an integral part of this annual excursion. Every year Port students, staff and all of our supporters make a huge difference to the lives of many of the orphan children there. They enhance Klang School by providing new equipment and facilities, by donations of toys, games and educational items, or through sponsoring students to be able to attend on an annual basis. This year we were all so proud of being able to achieve all of the above and make so many long-lasting memories for all concerned.

In addition to the sculpture, Port School and all of our supporters managed to donate enough to pay for and sponsor nine orphan students for the 2018 school year. This includes the children's school fees, uniform and food for the year.














In the evening students enjoyed (well most did!!) the Malaysian food and some of the very ornate Sri Mahamariamman Hindu temple at I-city Shah Alam.



The Sri Mahamariamman Temple is the oldest Hindu temple in Kuala Lumpur, Malaysia. Founded in 1873, it is situated at edge of Chinatown in Jalan Bandar (formerly High Street). In 1968, a new structure was built, featuring the ornate 'Raja Gopuram' tower in the style of South Indian temples. From its foundation, the temple provided an important place of worship for early Indian immigrants. It is now an important cultural and national monument.


After the temple, students took in the lights of the colourful i-City with an amazing array of shapes, colours and sizes.






Melaka is a Malaysian state on the Malay Peninsula's southwest coast. The capital, Melaka City, has a colonial past, seen in its preserved town centre, the site of the 16th-century,



Portuguese St. Paul's Church. It's also home to Christ Church, built by the Dutch in the 18th century. Next to Christ Church in Red Square is the Stadthuys, the Dutch-era town hall, now housing a museum of Melakan history and ethnography.











Whilst in Melaka, we helped to celebrate Jami's sixteenth birthday, and what better way than to head to Hard Rock Café- Melaka












#### Day 6, 7 & 8 - Kellie's Castle & Gopeng Rainforest Resort

After an action-packed 5 days travelling around Malaysia, it was time to head off for some more cultural experiences in the Cameron Highlands, with a stop at Kellie's Castle on the way to Gopeng Rainforest. Kellie's Castle is located in Batu Gajah, Kinta District, Perak, Malaysia. A Scottish planter named William Kellie Smith built the unfinished ruined mansion.





Kellie's Castle was meant to be a home away from home for William Kellie Smith in the early 20th Century. Being far away from home, Kellie desired his new residence to be reminiscent of his home back in Scotland. The castle is perched on top of a hill in what used to be a rubber plantation estate.





William Kellie Smith was an interesting man who was popular with his South Indian workers. Kind at heart, he erected a Hindu shrine for his workers on the castle premises. As a token of appreciation, his workers erected a statue of Kellie complete with a white suit and hat.

Construction of this unique castle began in 1915. However, it came to an abrupt halt with Kellie's sudden death in 1926. The solitary castle looks almost surreal in the wild plantations of Perak; it projects a strong personality and an aura of mystery.



After a hot and sticky day on the road it was great to finally arrive at Gopeng and our accommodation for the next few nights. Gopeng is set in the tranquility of the Cameron Highlands and is truly idyllic.







Gopeng is a small town located about 18km south of Ipoh & 16km north of Kampar in Perak State, Malaysia. It is about 200km north of Malaysia's capital, Kuala Lumpur.



Gopeng Rainforest is blessed with rich natural environmental surroundings. With many crystal clear rivers, streams, local and native villages, orchards, nearby caves, waterfalls, flora and fauna, it is a harmonious blend of nature and diversity providing the perfect getaway to nature and eco-adventure. While trekking in the nearby Malaysian rainforest, we were rewarded with the unique sightings of the world's largest flower, the rare Rafflesia, beautiful Rajah Brooke butterflies, giant stick insects and many others. This vast area is a paradise for nature lovers and adventurers to explore further.

Our first afternoon consisted of caving at Kandu Caves, Gua Tempurung. Deep within the jungle of Malaysia is one of the most majestic white marble and limestone towers called Gua Tempurung. Concealed within this limestone massif is an intricate system of caves of various dimensions honeycombed inside the limestone hills.







Port students got up close and personal with nature on the Kampar River, white water rafting. They were encompassed by exotic and mystifying rainforest on either side of the river with butterflies peacefully collecting nectar on the riverbank, whilst enjoying the thrills of the river rapids on a raft.



On the river, students had the thrills of tackling rapids and paddling down clear water amidst lush rainforest and passing some old rehabilitated tin mining sites.


Certainly not for the faint hearted!!!

Day 8 - Orang Asli Traditional Village - Gopeng


Before heading back to Klang students, we were lucky enough to be invited to spend the morning at a

local Orang Asli tribal village




Students were lucky enough to be invited for a traditional lunch with some very interesting food.








Meeting the locals, making necklaces from leaves and trying their hand at blow dart shooting were just some of the activities undertaken whilst there.





# Day 9 - Wisma Harapan, Petaling Street Markets & Petronas Towers

Once again this year the group visited the Selangor Association Mentally Handicapped (SAMH) School and headquarters in Kuala Lumpur called Wisma Harapan. A warm welcome was given to us all, with

some craft activities, donations from Port students and a fabulous Malaysian lunch provided.












After a busy morning at Wisma Harapan, we headed to Batu Caves. Batu Caves is a limestone hill that has a series of caves and cave temples in Gombak, Selangor, Malaysia. It takes its name from the Sungai Batu (Batu River), which flows past the hill and also it is the tenth (Pattu in Tamil) limestone hill from Ampang. Batu Caves is also the name of the nearby village.







The cave is one of the most popular Hindu shrines outside India and is dedicated to Lord Murugan. It is the focal point of the Hindu festival of Thaipusam in Malaysia.





Port students had a look at all the cheap and nasty fake goods, as well as experiencing the smells and culture of the numerous stalls in Kuala Lumpur's Petaling Street Markets.

On the way back to the hotel, we decided to have a look at the Petronas Towers. Sadly timings this year did not allow us to go to the top to the skybridge and viewing deck, but it was a glorious day to view from the ground & see this spectacular piece of engineering.





The towers were designed by Argentine architect César Pelli. Planning on the Petronas Towers started on 1 January 1992 and included rigorous tests and simulations of wind and structural loads on the design. Seven years of construction followed, beginning on 1 March 1993 with the excavation. This involved moving 500 truckloads of earth every night to dig down 30 metres (98ft) below the surface. The 88-floor towers are constructed largely of reinforced concrete, with a steel and glass facade designed to resemble motifs found in Islamic art, a reflection of Malaysia's Muslim religion.



## Day 10 – Sunway Lagoon

Sunway is a chill day and a chance for students to reflect on what they have been part of over the last ten days, whilst having a blast in one of Asia's biggest theme parks. With a massive water park, adventure theme park and wildlife park it offers an all day, non-stop range of activities.









# Day 11 – Boomerang Painting, Donations & Farewells



That has allowed us to sponsor 9 orphan students to attend for one year in 2018.
